1 Kauppatori 2 🗏 🖺

(Market Square) 2. Market open: Mon-Sat, in the summer also Sun. Havis Amanda Fountain (Ville Vallgrén, 1908). The blue building by the square is the City Hall and the pale vellow one further down is the Presidential Palace. There are ferry and water bus services to Suomenlinna Sea Fortress and in the summer to Korkeasaari Zoo.To the right stands the Orthodox Uspensky Cathedral.

2 Senaatintori 2

(Senate Square) 2. The Neoclassical ensemble around the Senate Square was created by the German-born architect C.L. Engel in the early 19th century. To the right of the Helsinki Cathedral is the Palace of the Council of State, to the left the main building of the University of Helsinki and the National Library of Finland. The statue in the square depicts Emperor Alexander II (Walter Runeberg, 1894).

3 Aleksanterinkatu 2

Aleksanterinkatu is one of the city's busiest shopping streets.

4 Mikonkatu 2

In the northern side of the square you see the Finnish National Theatre (Onni Tarjanne, 1902). In the front of it a statue of the writer Aleksis Kivi (Wäinö Aaltonen, 1939).

To the left, the Ateneum Art Museum (Theodor Höjer. 1887) which houses the largest collections of art in Finland.

5 Rautatieasema 2 M 🚔

Central Railway Station (Eliel Saarinen, 1918). Access to an underground shopping area and to the metro as well as an HSL service point. At the Mannerheimintie junction, to the right Lasipalatsi (Glass Palace), and the monument of President J.K. Paasikivi (Harry Kivijärvi, 1980), On the opposite side of the street the Main Post Office, Sanoma House (Jan Söderlund and Antti-Matti Siikala, 1995), the Museum of Contemporary Art Kiasma (Steven Holl. 1998) and the equestrian stattue of C.G. Mannerheim, the Marshall of Finland (Aimo Tukiainen, 1960), Next the Helsinki Music Centre (Marko Kivistö, Ola Laiho and Mikko Pulkkinen 2011), across the street the Parliament Building (J.S. Sirén1924-31) and the National Museum. On the opposite side of the street the City Museum (Villa Hakasalmi) and Finlandia Hall (Alvar Aalto, 1962-75).

6 Simonkatu 2

To the right the Kamppi centre housing a shopping centre, bus terminal and metro station. In front of the centre in Narinkkatori, the entrepreneur statue (Eva Löfdahl, 2006). Opposite the centre

in the old bus station, the City Planning Department's information and exhibition space Laituri.

7 Kamppi(M) 2 M

To the right Tennis Palace (Helge Lundström, 1937) which houses a movie theatre and the Tennis Palace Art Museum, Nearby in Malminkatu Helsinki Synagogue.

8 Kauppakorkeakoulut 2

Straight ahead to the right Aalto University School of Economics (Hugo Harmia and Woldemar Baeckman. 1950) and to the left Hanken School of Economics (Swedish language business school) (Kurt Simberg, 1951-1953). Behind on Arkadiankatu the Natural History Museum and the statue 'Elk' (Jussi Mäntynen, 1924).

9 Sammonkatu 2

To the right behind the block of buildings the Temppeliaukio Church (Timo and Tuomo Suomalainen, 1961-70).

10 Apollonkatu 2

11 Töölöntori

(Töölö Market Square) 2 Market open Mon-Sat

12 Ooppera 2

The Finnish National Opera (Hvvämäki - Karhunen -Parkkinen, 1993). In the other side, the Olympic Stadium (Yrjö Lindegren and Toivo Jäntti. 1933-51) and the

Sports Museum. In front of the Stadium, statues of the long-distance runners Paavo Nurmi (Wäinö Aaltonen 1925) and Lasse Viren (Terho Sakki, 1994).

13 Töölön halli 2

To the left, a tram depot, Tram Museum and Koriaamo Culture Factory. The Sibelius Monument at a short walk along Humalistonkatu.

14 Kansaneläkelaitos 2

Headquarters of the Social Insurance Institution of Finland (Alvar Aalto,1956). To the right, Helsinki Ice Hall and Sonera Stadium football arena.

15 Auroran sairaala 2

(Aurora Hospital) 2. To the right, Stadion Hostel and The Crescendo, a memorial to those who fell in the Civil War of 1918 (Taisto Martiskainen, 1970)



(Student House) 3 To the left, the Swedish Theatre (Eero Saarinen, 1936) and the Esplanadi Park, Back to the left a statue called "Three Smiths" (Felix Nylund, 1932).

Various design boutiques. To the right, Café Ekberg, the oldest cafe in Helsinki.

32 Eiran sairaala 3

(Eira Hospital) 3. To the right, Mikael Agricola Church (Lutheran, Lars Sonck, 1935) and Eira Hospital (Lars Sonck. 1905). A district with Art Nouveau architecture.

33 Kapteeninkatu 3

35 Kaivopuisto 3

(Kaivopuisto Park) 3. To the right, the Roman Catholic St. Henry's Cathedral (Lohrman, 1856-1860). Kaivopuisto is home to several foreign embassies.

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
